### How Knights added "Under God" to the Pledge

Patriotism and faith compelled Knights to petition U.S. government to make addition in the early 1950s

The Pledge of Allegiance has undergone several revisions since it was initially written back in 1892 by Baptist minister Francis Bellamy. The last significant change came in 1954 during the midst of the Cold War, when President Dwight Eisenhower signed a congressional resolution adding the words "under God."

This revision would have never happened without advocacy by the Knights of Columbus. READ MORE

A look back on Canadian Knights' World War II efforts in celebration of Canada Day

The first Canadian Knights of Columbus council – Montreal Council 284 – was founded only 30 years after that country became an independent nation. Since then, Canadian Knights have proudly adhered to the principles of charity and patriotism, which is exhibited by their service during World War II.

Nearly 1.1 million Canadians served on the frontlines in Europe, Northern Africa and the North Atlantic, as well as in the Pacific, from the war's start to its end in 1945. Meanwhile, thousands of Canadian Knights volunteered to serve their country in defense of freedom. READ MORE

The Knights of Columbus was founded at a time in U.S. history when Catholics faced harsh discrimination and were frequently looked down upon as morally and socially inferior. Throughout its history, the Knights has stood up for religious liberty as guaranteed by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

The Knight's fight for religious liberty has taken many forms – from 19th-century efforts to dispel suspicions that Catholics could not be faithful citizens due to their loyalty to the pope, to current support for Christians and other religious minorities in the Middle East. READ MORE

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# Knights of Columbus and the great American pastime

K of C members have played baseball from the start – here's a look at how K of C-sponsored baseball leagues helped Catholics in America

America's first professional baseball team, the Cincinnati Red Stockings, formed in 1869. It would take another 13 years before Father Michael J. McGivney and parishioners at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Conn., founded the Knights of Columbus. At that point, Major League Baseball wasn't established, but baseball was already the nation's game.

At the time of the Order's founding, Catholics were not held in high-esteem, often taking the most dangerous jobs for little pay. They were also seen as papists, loyal only to Rome, not as patriotic American citizens. But on the baseball field, it was about your skills, not your religion. READ MORE
